Retail theft & ORC isn't a victimless crime. It harms public safety, the communities, and the economy.

A Growing National Crisis

Retail theft is no longer petty crime — it's a national economic and public-safety emergency.

- \$112 Billion lost nationwide to theft and Organized Retail Crime (ORC).
- +19% increase in shoplifting and merchandise theft.

• 54% increase in repeat-offender thefts. • 64% of thefts go unreported. • 46% increase in violence during thefts; 17% target employees.

Washington: Leader in Retail Theft

Washington leads the nation in retail theft with devastating consequences for businesses, workers, and communities.

#1 in the U.S. for retail theft rates —
3,510 cases per 100,000 businesses.
\$2.7 Billion in stolen goods (2021).

• \$3.65 Billion in total retail-crime costs. • \$603 Million in lost state tax revenue (2021).

Across Washington Communities

Real-world cases show theft is pervasive, emboldened, and statewide:

• Lynnwood: thefts grew from 446 (2015) to 2,364 (2024). Lynnwood Times. • Seattle: 13,103 police calls at top 100 retail sites (2022). Seattle City Auditor, 2023. • King County/Seattle: King County accounts for 10% of Nordstrom's global theft. KIRO 7 News. • Western WA: \$537,000 stolen by organized ring. Bellevue Police Department. • Spokane: \$22,800 in merchandise stolen in 3 months. KHQ News.

The Business Fallout

Retail theft drains more than revenue — it erodes communities.

1.6% of U.S. retail sales lost annually.
28% of retailers closed stores; 45% cut hours; 30% reduced inventory.
